A Brief History of Daylight Saving Time

Daylight saving time (DST) was first implemented on a national level by Germany in 1916 as a wartime energy-saving measure, with many other countries following suit during World War I. The modern concept was previously proposed by George Hudson in 1895 and William Willett in 1907. In the United States, DST was introduced in 1918, repealed after the war, and later made permanent and standardized by the Uniform Time Act of 1966.

Early proposals and implementation

- Early concepts:

The idea of adjusting clocks to make better use of daylight was proposed by New Zealander George Hudson in 1895 and later by British builder William Willett in 1907, who argued it would save energy and allow for more afternoon recreation. A satirical essay by Benjamin Franklin in 1784 also suggested that rising earlier could save on candle usage.

- First national adoption:

Germany was the first country to implement DST nationwide in 1916 during World War I, with the goal of saving coal and energy. Other countries, including the United States in 1918, followed suit during the war.

Turn your clock back!

Date: Sunday, November 2, 2025

Time: 2 a.m. local time

Action: Set clocks back by one hour

US History

- Wartime and post-war periods:

The US adopted DST in 1918 but repealed it after the war. It was briefly reinstated nationwide as a “War Time” during World War II. Without a federal law, states had the freedom to observe it or not, leading to a confusing patchwork of time zones across the country.

- The Uniform Time Act (1966):

Congress passed the Uniform Time Act of 1966 to standardize the practice, establishing a consistent start and end date for DST across the nation.

- Subsequent changes:

The start and end dates have been adjusted several times since 1966, notably during the 1970s oil crisis and again with the Energy Policy Act of 2005, which set the current timeframe of the second Sunday in March to the first Sunday in November.
