

Students from first grade to high school can participate in Read to Feed.

Funds raised support Heifer's mission of ending hunger and poverty while caring for the Earth. With this money, students purchased [animals/resources purchased], which will go to struggling families around the world.

Read to Feed encourages students to practice their literacy skills. Throughout the program, students recruit sponsors per book read.

Most importantly, Read to Feed shows students that they have the power to make a difference in the world! Funds raised will benefit struggling families, giving them the opportunity, skills and resources needed to create better futures for themselves.

Read to Feed is a reading incentive and fundraising program for children that supports Heifer International. Participants obtain sponsorships from parents, friends and relatives based on the number of books (or units of time) they read. The goal is to promote reading and help Heifer assist millions of people around the world feed their families and reach self-reliance through the gifts of livestock and training.
