Strategic Plan Part 4: Leaving a Connected Legacy – Expanded Checklist

Leadership Continuity & Mentorship

- ☐ Create written descriptions and guides for officer roles
- ☐ Host a leadership panel with past presidents or officers
- ☐ Develop a mentor or buddy system for new or potential leaders
- ☐ Encourage shadowing of officers and board roles
- ☐ Host a training day or retreat for current and future leaders
- ☐ Create small leadership teams or committees to divide responsibilities
- ☐ Recognize and reward leadership at all levels, including first-time chairs

Preserving Club History & Traditions

- ☐ Keep a club scrapbook with photos, programs, and clippings
- ☐ Digitize documents and store electronically for future access
- ☐ Create a 'Club History Corner' display at meetings or events
- ☐ Record oral histories or interviews with long-standing members
- ☐ Celebrate key traditions annually and document their stories
- ☐ Develop a club timeline showing historical milestones
- ☐ Nominate historical members or projects for recognition at the Federation level

Building Long-Term Impact

- ☐ Establish a club scholarship or grant program with clear criteria
- ☐ Develop a relationship with a local nonprofit as a long-term partner
- ☐ Create or maintain a community project that is publicly visible (e.g., park bench, mural, garden)
- ☐ Designate an annual 'Legacy Project' for outgoing presidents
- ☐ Keep a written plan or calendar of annual projects for continuity
- ☐ Participate in Federation programs that ensure long-term visibility
- ☐ Nominate the club or members for awards to raise public awareness
- ☐ Write articles or letters to the editor about the club's community impact

MARCH IS NATIONAL READING MONTH

March is National Reading Month, a nationwide initiative aimed at fostering a love for reading among children and adults through daily reading, school events, and library activities. Often kicking off on Read Across America Day (March 2), it promotes literacy, improves vocabulary, and enhances cognitive skills, with many schools adopting themed activities.

Key Aspects of National Reading Month:

- Significance: It serves to motivate all age groups to make reading a daily habit, enhancing imagination, memory, and empathy.
- History & Focus: The month aligns with the National Education Association (NEA)'s Read Across America initiative, encouraging diverse, inclusive reading choices.
- Celebration Ideas:
 - Schools: Organize read-a-thons, guest reader events, and character dress-up days.
 - Families: Create a cozy reading corner, visit local libraries, and read aloud for 15-20 minutes daily.
 - Adults: Start a book club, try a new genre, or read short stories.

Children can enjoy a diverse collection of stories, islands, and fun with RIF's refreshed reading app, designed specifically for young users.

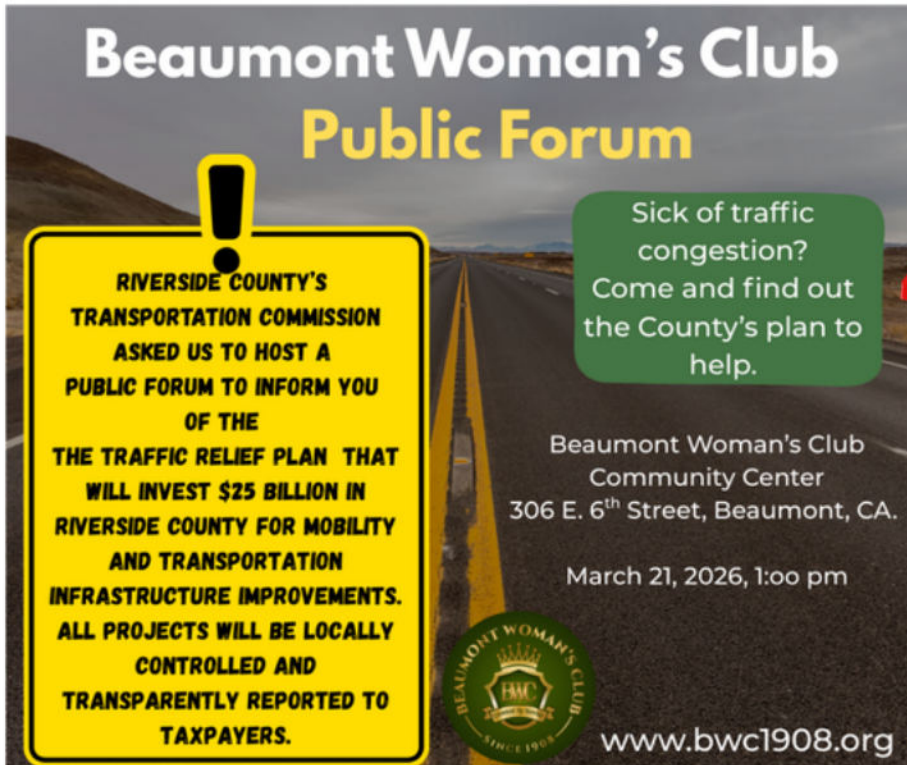

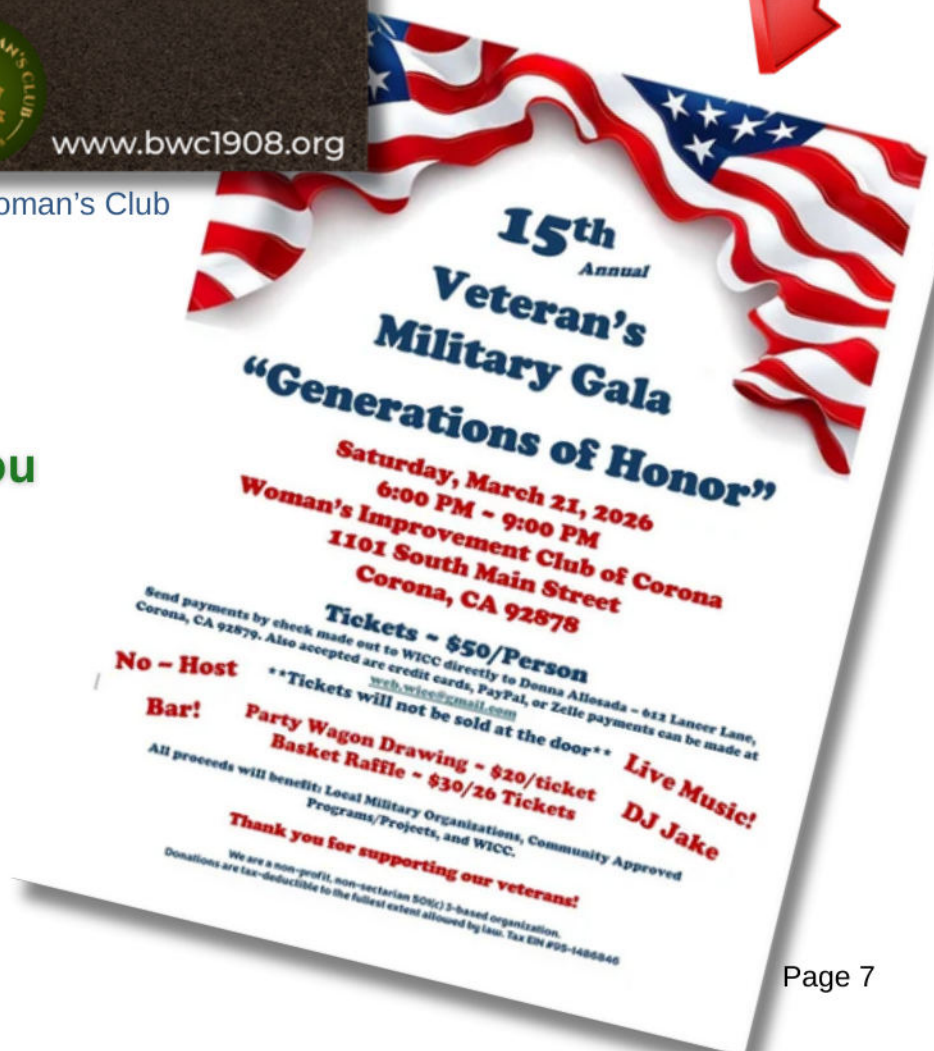
